To the Marion Black Knight Learning Community,

As we head into spring I'm always watching for the first robins and violets, listening for the first spring peepers, and thinking about growth. At Marion I'm proud of the responsible, sustainable programming growth we've been able to provide for our students. Our agriculture programming has continued to grow with increasing student course enrollments and our expanding National FFA Organization chapter. We have provided enrichment and intervention opportunities for our Junior-Senior High School students with our mid-day programming. At Marion Elementary School, students have had the chance to explore their interests or try out a new skill through our mini-camp programming. This type of programming growth helps

students explore their interests and find positive connections to school.

While keeping sustainable growth in mind throughout our budget planning process, the Marion Central School District seeks to balance the long term financial security of the district with current financial realities, while still providing the very best programming and educational experiences we can for our students. This year, unlike the rest of the school districts in Wayne County, our foundation aid from New York State has stayed flat at three percent. On the expense side of our budget, inflation, energy costs and health care costs have made a big impact. The 2023-24 school year will be the last year we receive the American Rescue Plan funding from the

federal government. Knowing these constraints, we have developed a fiscally conservative budget that meets the needs of our students and community.

With a tax levy increase of 2.30%, this year's budget is tax cap compliant and all homeowners will remain eligible for the property tax relief checks. We appreciate the

Marion community's ongoing support of our students and our goal of sustainable programming for our District. I encourage all of you to exercise your right to vote on May 16.

2023-2024 DISTRICT BUDGET PROPOSAL

The process of developing a budget begins in December each

year, and includes input from stakeholders in the school community, well as members of the Board of Education. The District employs objectives for budget development focused upon supporting Philosophical Marion's includina Framework. instructional innovative practices and personalized learning, in a way that is fiscally responsible and sustainable.

Despite next year's 7% increase in health

care costs and rising costs due to inflation, the district was able to limit

the overall budget increase less debt service in the proposed 2023-2024

budget to just 0.87%. This was largely accomplished through personnel attrition and a careful analysis of "needs" versus "wants" across all budget line items. The State has increased Foundation aid by 3% which helps mitigate the additional costs due to health care and inflation.

The District's projected tax levy increase to support this proposal is 2.3%. This proposed levy increase is below the Governor's calculated tax cap for the

district, making homeowners eligible for their property tax relief checks.


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2023-2024 PROPOSED REVENUE SOURCES



DID YOU KNOW?

- The True Value Tax Rate peaked in 2016 at \$23.96 per \$1000. In 2022, the True Tax Rate was \$17.88. This is a decrease of over \$6 since 2016.
- The projected true value tax rate is \$0.13 lower than the tax rate from last year.
- Property taxes account for 32.4% of Marion's operating revenue, which is in the bottom third of districts in the Finger Lakes.

^{*}Tax rates will vary by town based upon assessment levels – The District does not determine assessment levels.



FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

WILL MY TAX RATE INCREASE BY THE SAME PERCENTAGE AS THE TAX LEVY?

No. The District does not set the tax rate. The District can only set the local tax levy, which is calculated using the NYS tax cap formula. The tax levy is the total amount of taxes a school district raises to help fund its budget and Marion's proposed levy for the annual 2023-24 school budget is \$7,341,759; roughly a third of the total budget. Tax rates are then determined based upon several factors, including each town's assessment values and equalization rates. Tax rates cannot be accurately determined until the summer after the school budget is passed, when assessment values and equalization rates are finalized.

WHAT IS THE EQUALIZATION RATE? DOES THIS IMPACT PROPERTY TAXES?

Equalization Rates indicate the ratio of assessed value to market value in any given municipality. They are designed to ensure that owners of properties with similar market values pay an equivalent amount of taxes, even though their assessed values may differ by township.

The District can only establish the tax levy. Tax rates are subject to a home's assessed value and the town's equalization rate, which is determined by the real property tax office of NYS. A town at 100% equalization will pay the District's true value tax rate, while a town with a rate lower than 100% will pay an incrementally higher tax rate to equalize the amount of taxes paid.

CASEY STEINER NAMED PRINCIPAL

AT MARION ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Throughout her career as an educator, Casey Steiner has asked herself one question while making daily decisions: "Am I making things better for kids?"

With a core belief that "students are at the heart of what we do," the Marion Central School District is proud to announce that Steiner has been named the new Principal of Marion Elementary School, effective Tuesday, March 14.

Steiner's appointment was approved by the Marion Central School District's Board of Education at their regular meeting on Monday, March 13. Steiner succeeds Dr. Ellen Lloyd, who was named Superintendent of Schools on Feb. 1.

"I recognize the magnitude of this position and am eager to rise to the challenge," said Steiner, who has served as Interim Principal at MES since

Feb. 1. "Families put their trust in the school to do right by their children and that is a huge responsibility."

Steiner came to Marion as an Assistant Principal for grades Pre-K through 12 in July 2021, and has worked closely with Lloyd over the past 20 months.

"Casey is thoughtful and reflective and centers her decisions based on what is right for students," Lloyd said. "She has high integrity. She is honest and direct but is also very caring and wants MES to be the best school and learning environment that it can be."

Steiner said that one thing has stood out during her time at MES.

"The people," she said. "Our students are incredible and resilient and just amazing to work with and their families are incredible. The staff is

so student-centered and is willing to go the extra mile on everything all of the time."

One of her priorities is to help MES "grow with its needs" and she plans to spend time observing and investigating certain aspects that may need improvement. She is also fully committed to preserving the after-school mini-camp program that is already in place.

"Mini-camps provide an opportunity for kids to build their social competencies and to connect with adults while doing something that they enjoy," Steiner said. "It gives them time to build skills, have fun and be pro-social when they could be at home playing video games."

Prior to coming to Marion, Steiner served as the Multi-Tiered Systems of Support Coordinator for Lyons Central School from 2015-2021. She holds a Master of Science in school psychology from Roberts Wesleyan College and a Certificate of Advanced Study in Educational Leadership from the University of Rochester.

Steiner resides in Phelps with her husband and two children. She is a graduate of Midlakes High School and her hobbies include gardening, cooking and watching football. She is eager to get started in her new role and the opportunities that lie ahead.

"I am most excited about seeing where we can go," Steiner said. "The staff is so committed to the students and I just want to see what we can do for the students and the community."

PROPOSITION #1: BUDGET

WHAT: The ballot will appear as: Be it resolved, that the Board of Education of Marion Central School District, County of Wayne, New York, is hereby authorized to expend the amount of \$22,687,300 for the 2023-2024 school year and to levy the necessary taxes thereof.

WHY: This proposition approves the district's proposed operating budget for the 2023-2024 school year. The budget is tax cap compliant and will generate a property tax relief check for eligible homeowners.

PROPOSITION #2: BUS PURCHASE

- NO TAX IMPACT -

WHAT: The ballot will appear as: Be it resolved, that the Board of Education of Marion Central School District, County of Wayne, New York, is hereby authorized to use up to an estimated aggregate cost of \$400,000 of the 2010 and 2019 Bus Purchase Capital Reserve to fund any portion of the purchase of two (2) full size passenger school buses and one (1) small passenger school bus.

WHY: The District has a five-year bus purchase plan Buses purchased by the District are aided by the state over a 5 year period, and the District will recover over 85% of the initial purchase price of each bus. Buses also carry a warranty period of 5 years. As a result of this plan, the purchase of all buses operated by the District will supported by state aid revenue while the vehicle is also covered by warranty.

PROPOSITION #3: STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE ON BOE

WHAT: The ballot will appear as: Be it resolved, that the Board of Education of Marion Central School District, County of Wayne, New York, is hereby authorized to allow a student to serve on the Board as an ex officio, non-voting member.
